Article begins with not really a headline but a **standfirst** followed by **bullet-point kickers** – key points of the story designed to be read quickly

'slipped & hit his head' suggests there may be some doubt about how he died; this is often code for being drunk.

Fit and healthy chef Gary Rhodes died from a brain injury when he 'slipped and hit his head' after dinner with Jennie at their home, say family as friend reveals his last words to him were 'life couldn't be better'

- EXCLUSIVE: Chef Gary Rhodes slipped and hit his head, a close friend revealed

Article includes **1 video**. Advert plays when video is clicked. These ads change each time.


subtitles help to make video more **user-friendly** – viewers may watch the content at work with volume down. This is also disability friendly (for hard of hearing).

Video is an example of:

cross-media / cross-platform dynamic content digital convergence.







each photo contains a menu/bar of social media icons – helps user interaction and content-sharing (Shirky).

article contains **biographical** details & a childhood photo, placed towards the end of the report.

The article contains 2 **sidebars** – one about brain injuries and the other about avoiding a head injury following an accident when he was 19.

Breaks up text and adds interesting background. Thorough coverage.

Social media comment – screenshots of tweets &

instagram posts from celebrity chefs and friends are included in the middle of the article. Includes an Instagram post from Jamie Oliver and a tweet from Gordon Ramsay.

Social media posts through the day include tributes + reaction to clarification details from family in the evening that he died of a head injury, not as a result of a fall.

Gary Rhodes was warned as a teenager about suffering another brain injury after neardeath accident

Chef Gary Rhodes was warned by doctors at the age of 19 about avoiding another head injury after a near-fatal road collision.

Medics said he suffered a blood clot on the brain in a near-death accident when he was a teenager and needed eight hours of brain surgery.

Rhodes was hit by a van while working his first full-time job at the Hilton in Amsterdam in 1979.
